

PROLOGUE

"A JOURNEY THROUGH MEXICO" was created by the Board of Directors of Raices de México as the artistic component of three diverse concerts we produce annually, the other two being educational and community. "A JOURNEY THROUGH MEXICO" showcases the most popular and diverse material found within Mexican folklore dance that Raices de México has to offer. Two of the regions, Costa de Navarit and Colima, were San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival winners in 1994 and 1997, respectively. Trio Pacheco, a musical group from the Menlo Park/Redwood City area, is comprised of three cousins (Javier, Raul and Rene Pacheco) who started playing together at family parties for fun 20 years ago. This ocassional entertainment became a serious endeavor when the Trio began to play at St. Joseph Obrero church in Redwood City where they can be found any Sunday morning at 10:00. The Trio can play a varity of music from ceremonial to dance. Trio Pacheco also makes up part of the orquestra, Pacheco All Stars along with more cousins and other talented local musicians. Trio Pacheco is joined this evening by veteran Bay Area musician, Carlos Castellanos on alto saxophone. Carlos is also a member of the orquestra. Pacheco All Stars. Adrian Franco, has been entertaining people with his intricate rope tricks since he was a child of five years old. Adrian is a member of the Equipo Asociación Charro Hacienda Valle de Sunol, CA (Associated Charro Hacienda Team of Sunol Valley, CA). Adrian competes with other rope tricksters at the local as well as the national level. Raíces de México is happy to have Adrian Franco back for a third guest appearance. This year Raices de Mexico is honored to share the stage with Danza Xitlalli (Xitlalli means "star in the heavens" and "navel of the universe") a spiritual Aztec dance group that does not normally participate in this type of performance because they are not theatrical entertainers per se, they are spiritual dancers. Their dances are done in celebration of religious or cultural events such as Cuauhtemoc (Feb) in honor of male warriors, young and old; Fiesta de Colores (Mar) in honor of springtime and children; Xilonen (Jun) in honor of young girls' transition into womanhood, etc. Monies that Danza Xitlalli raise go toward feeding the hungry in San Francisco.

DANZA XITLALLI

A Mexica-Aztec traditional ceremonial dance group formed in 1981 by Macuil Xochitl, Danza Xitlalli's purpose is to preserve and disseminate the rich spiritual, cultural and artistic heritage of the Mexica people of México. The group consists of 35-40 men, women, and children primarily from San Francisco but also from other Bay Area cities. Danza Xitlalli has stimulated community understanding and appreciation for Aztec Dance traditions via presentations in schools, universities, community centers, Native American Pow Wows, and cultural celebrations throughout the Bay Area, the State, other parts of the U.S., and México. Macuil Xochitl, the group's "Jefe" or leader began practicing this tradition in Mexico City in 1973. Her teachers have included Jefe Generales Andrés Segura, Pedro Rodriguez, Teresa Mejía Osorio, Ernesto Ortíz, and Maria Robles Ortiz. In 1992, Macuil Xochitl was formally recognized in México as the "Jefe" of Danza Xitlalli. Her dedication to Danza Azteca is a lifelong commitment. Currently Macuil Xochitl is a California Arts Council Artists in Communities Grant recipient which allows her to provide classes in after school programs at Horace Mann Middle School. These classes are open to community members at large who respect the traditions of Danza Azteca. For more information on Danza Xitlalli call Ms. Robán San Miguel (415) 584-7910. About the Company - Raices de México

Raices de México was founded in 1980 in East Palo Alto and became the first non-profit tax-exempt Mexican artistic and cultural organization in the County of San Mateo. Raices is centrally located on the Peninsula and as such, is able to produce and participate in artistic, cultural, and educational events throughout the Bay Area.

Raices has a Board of Directors who oversee the operations of a childrens' dance group, a beginning and intermediate adults' dance group, and a performing group. In addition to dancing in events throughout the Bay Area, Raices produces its own individualized annual events. These events have dual goals since they not only enhance the lives of the participants and celebrate the rich heritage of the Mexican community but they also enrich the lives of the entire community by exposing a broad audience to programs of high artistic and educational value.

Over the course of nearly 20 years *Raices* has built an impressive repertoire of material showcasing a diverse array of Mexican arts, culture, and history. Specifically, *Raices* has accumulated authentic costumes for performing eighteen distinct regions of Mexican dance, including the corresponding music, videotapes, and the narratives on the cultural and historical significance of these dance forms.

Considering that the organization has been dependent on the volunteer efforts of several key people, the accomplishments of *Raices* are more noteworthy than organizations with large budgets and staffs in charge of daily operations.


