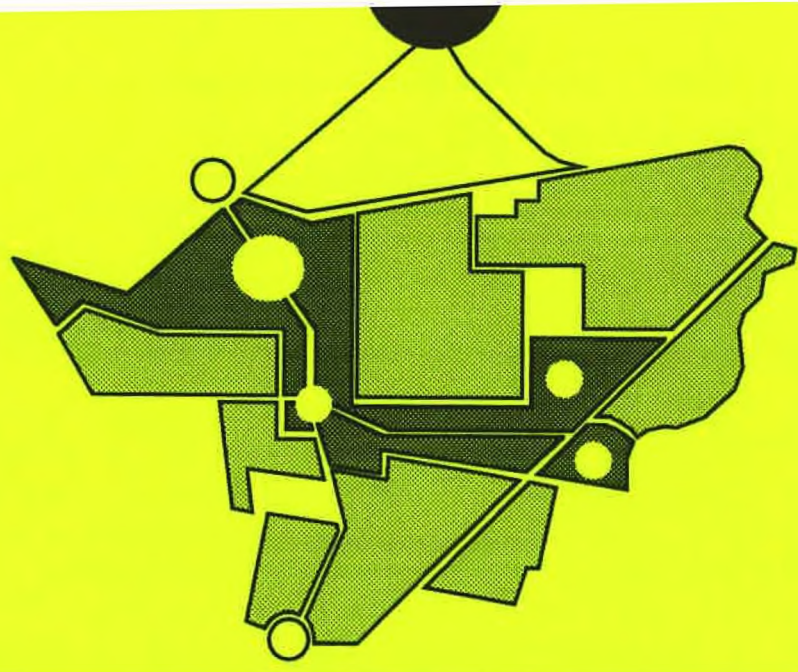


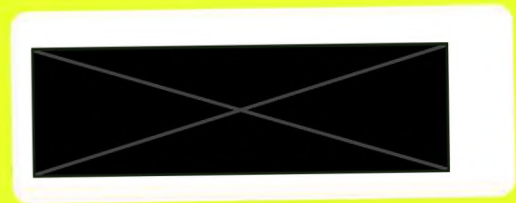

- **Missed First Tuesdays.** Sorry, but sometimes council meetings get scheduled on top of First Tuesdays, usually due to holidays. When this happens, or any time for that matter, just call. *Aug 5TH*
- **Where is Downtown? What is Downtown?** Put *July 28th* on your calendar for a workshop where you can influence the ultimate look and feel of our town "spine," running from University Circle and Ravenswood Shopping Center along Donohoe, up University to Four Corners, out Bay Road to Ravenswood Business Park, and finally to Cooley Landing. Where is downtown? Where do the small businesses and non-profits from Whiskey Gulch go? And a big grocery store? Point to what you like and don't like from a set of *pictures* of other towns.
- **Go Buy Something!** You must have heard by now that Office Depot is open and Home Depot is hiring. You may not have heard that Office Depot has a full-service copy center in it. Home Depot opens July 22nd.
- **Communicating with "City Hall".** The complaints I hear most are "We don't know what's going on" and "The Council is out of touch." The City's 1999/2000 budget includes a community relations position and a quarterly newsletter, for the first time in many years. This is progress.
- **Concrete Batch Plant.** The decision to allow a concrete batch plant in the industrial area temporarily during redevelopment construction was the most controversial vote the Council has taken lately. After studying all the information I had, my best judgement was that there will be no significant health risks and that other feared impacts, such as traffic, will be small. Some thoughtful people honestly reached a different conclusion. To do the topic justice and to clarify my own thinking, I wrote up a set of notes. I'd like to share them with you if you are interested. Just leave a message on my voicemail.
- **Please Return Survey.** Politics is rough sometimes, but I was deeply troubled by two aspects of the concrete batch mixing plant controversy. Some opponents of the project intentionally spread fear in the community by calling it a "cement plant" (a noisy, dangerous manufacturing process) when they knew it was not. Some opponents suggested anyone who supported the project didn't care about the health and welfare of the community and/or was on the take. This sad and obvious cynicism prompted me to mail out the enclosed "Civic Index." It was developed by the National Civic League as a community self-check-up. I hope you will take ten minutes right now to fill it out. I'll tally up all the responses and put a summary in the next newsletter. Please don't waste the stamp I already put on it!
