



#### Introduction

NCDI has co-designed and implemented comprehensive community initiatives in many cities sponsored by local and/or national foundations such as:

In our work with community change initiatives, we have the dual goal of ensuring that the foundation's goals are met while equally respecting, educating and engaging the indigenous wisdom of community residents and leaders in the process of realizing sustainable community change.

Over the past four months, NCDI has been in discussions with the Douglas and Maria DeVos Foundation and Lighthouse Communities to co-design the *Believe to Become* neighborhood engagement model. This work will launch in June 2010.

### **NCDI's Theory of Change**

By training a critical mass of community leaders, by strengthening and connecting a target group of community organizations and by engaging a broad cross section of community members in planning, executing and assessing their social change strategy, communities of color will have the capacity to lead, govern, educate, provide for, support and protect themselves and be healthy, safe, empowered and vibrant places to live, work and play.

## NCDI Scope of Work Summary

NCDI has been responsible for many aspects of successful project implementation. This document highlights eight (8) areas that might inform the work those seeking to build capacity in communities of color using a place-based approach. The document includes, "Critical Roles, Best Practices, NCDI's Experience and NCDI Results"
