### Dear Residents:

Sometime back in May 2007, a resident wrote an open letter to the residents of East Palo Alto with a simple lament regarding the state of parks and recreation in East Palo Alto. From that letter, a meeting was convened of persons interested in conditions of city parks and the status of recreation programs provided and not provided to residents. The follow-up meetings led to the creation, in August of 2007 of the East Palo Alto Parks and Recreation Citizens Committee, (EPAPARCC) a membership association dedicated to assisting the community in the enhancement and development of recreation facilities and programs in the City of East Palo Alto.

The initial members of the association consisted of Marcia Perez, Shannon Pekary, Melvin Gaines, Danny Thompson, Lillian Hense, and Everardo Luna with members of my staff and me serving as the initial facilitators. Together the group established the following six goals for the association: 1) Ensuring access to public facilities, bathrooms, sports fields, parks including safety concerns; 2) Promoting the acquisition and development of more open space, parks and sports facilities; 5, Encouraging collaboration with neighboring cities and the local school district and schools to allow access to sports facilities; 4) Assisting in the creation of a city-supported support infrastructure for registrations as well as volunteer recruitment for local sports organizations; 5) Advocating for the establishment of a Parks and Recreation Commission; 6) the development of mechanisms to inform residents on available recreation activities and programs.

It is however the goal of providing information to residents that has consumed EPAPARCC since its creation. Through the extraordinary efforts of Marcia Perez and Shannon Pekary this activity guide has come into being. To address the challenge that the city faced in previous efforts of getting program and activity information consistently and on time so as to be able to publish with regularity an activity guide. The group under the leadership of Mr. Pekary developed a website based software that would allow individual organizations to input their program and activity information directly on their own. Several trainings were conducted and organizations were given independent access to the site and instructions as to how to upload their information. In addition, the association developed a partnership with Job-Train, a local training and employment agency to hire youth who would work with various organizations to assist them in their data upload.

In recognition of the fact that not every resident would have access to a computer, it was acknowledged that a print version of the website based guide would have to be developed and distributed to each home in the city. This activity guide represents that effort.

Even with these efforts, the guide may not be as complete as we may want, howmaiden issue will hopefully encourage every organization providing programs and activities to residents to join EPA-PARCC and the city to ensure that their programs and activities get maximal exposure and that residents have every opportunity to take advantage of them.

We are very happy to offer you this issue of the activity guide. We hope you enjoy it and find it useful; however, we would also love to get feedback from you as to how it can be improved. ### **Park Permits**

No person shall hold, conduct, carry on or cause to be held, conducted or carried on any special event upon any public property within the city or use any city facility without first having obtained a permit to do so issue pursuant to the City of East Palo Alto's Municipal Code as stated in codes 12.08.010, 12.08.020 and 12.08.050. All applicants will be required to appear in front of the City's Development Review Committee (DRC) whose meetings are held every Tuesday between 1:00 and 3:00pm. ### SUBMISSION DEADLINE

- 1. Permit applications for Parades are due at the Community Services
  Department Office 60 (sixty) working days prior to the date the scheduled event when (1) the event will have a parade requiring a street, or
  lane closure, or (2) the applicant is requesting all or partial waiver of
  the required permit fees.
- 2. For all other Special Event Permit requests completed applications are due thirty (30) working days prior to the scheduled event. Late applications will be considered on a case by case basis and may be denied at the City's discretion. \*(Working days are counted as Monday Friday, excludes Holidays and Weekends.) For special events seeking fee reductions or waivers, the 60 (sixty) working days prior to the date of the event requirement would apply.

### **REDVELOPEMENT AGENCY**

The Redevelopment Agency's main goal is abating blight, generating jobs, creating economic opportunities, and raising revenues that can be used to improve the quality of life for the residents of East Palo Alto. Location: 1960 Tate Street, East Palo Alto, CA 94303; Phone: 650-853-3186. The City's Redevelopment Agency supports the following activities:

Redevelopment Activities: Development projects within the redevelopment areas are either initiated or coordinated through the City's Redevelopment Agency. In general terms, the main functions of the Agency are to eliminate physical blight, expand the City's tax base, create and retain employment for local residents, and improve the City's physical infrastructure.

To put it in numerical terms, as a result of the Agency's efforts, with the creation of the Ravenswood 101 shopping center, the City's sales tax revenue has increased from \$262,000 back in 1992, to about \$2,400,000 in 2008. This phenomenal growth has enabled the City to become a financially viable and autonomous entity, the youngest City in the County. Thus, enabling its resident to take their future and land use decisions in their own hands.

In terms of jobs, in 2007, there were about 848 jobs in the Ravenswood 101 shopping center, a Redevelopment project. Of the 848 total jobs, 345 were filled by East Palo Alto residents. That represents 41% of the total jobs! Thus, Redevelopment has created employment that supports many East Palo Alto families.

With respect to assessed valuations of the Redevelopment areas, the Gateway 101 has increased from \$17M to \$307M from 1993 to 2007, and University Circle has increased from \$7M to \$373M from 1988 to 2007. This has generated substantial tax increment to fund the development of affordable housing and other redevelopment activities. Redevelopment allocates 20% of the total tax increment it receives to create affordable housing in East Palo Alto. Nugent Square on University Avenue, and the Courtyard project on Bay Road are two examples of affordable projects.

2. Economic Development Activities: The elected City Council also serves as the Redevelopment Agency Board of Directors, with the Mayor (Ruben Abrica) serving as the Vice-Chair of the Agency, and the Vice-Mayor (David Woods) serving as the Agency Chair. The City's Economic Development Activities are focused to create a healthy and thriving business environment in East Palo Alto by expanding employment, procurement and small business opportunities for East Palo Alto residents and local businesses, as well as attracting needed goods and services. The Agency early focus was to very rapidly create additional sources of revenue to make the City financially viable. With that initial goal achieved and the City now in a better financial position, the Agency is working to bring neighborhood serving retail and goods and services (such as a supermarket) not found in the community, as well as creating additional jobs that match our population's profile, enhancing our open space amenities and improving deficient infrastructure within the Redevelopment area.

# pployment Opportunities

The City of East Palo Alto Parole Reentry Program is introducing a pilot project. This project provides up to 90-day employment for parolees that can count towards qualifying for permanent employment with Caltrans via the Caltrans Service Assistant Maintenance exam.

To qualify, a parolee must be actively participating in programs and services at the East Palo Alto Parole Reentry Program, be able to lift at least 50 pounds and pass pre-employment drug screening. Parolees can earn up to \$10 per hour and will work an 8 hour day.

Work performed by parolees shall consist of, but not be limited to:

- Litter and debris removal
- Manual weed control

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- Paint over or remove graffiti
- Trim or remove unsightly, dead, or overgrown vegeta-
- Make firebreaks at fence lines where appropriate adjacent to shoulder
- Plant restoration in landscaped areas

### Salt Marsh Harvest Mouse

The salt marsh harvest mouse is a tiny, nocturnal rodent that lives in San Francisco Bay wetlands. The mouse can only be found along the Bay. It was listed as an **endangered species** in 1970.

Salt marsh harvest mice are among the smallest rodents in the United States. Their brown bodies are less than three inches long, which is about the size of a thumb, and weigh less than a nickel. Their tails can be as long or longer than their bodies, and they have grooved teeth.



Salt marsh harvest mice eat seeds, grasses, pickleweed and insects, and are active mostly at night. Unlike most mammals, their bodies are specially adapted to tolerate high concentrations of salt in food and water. The mice have been known to drink and survive on salt water or **brackish** water for long periods of time, which has given them a great advantage in the Bay's salty tidal marshes where only a limited number of creatures can survive.

Because of their small size, salt marsh harvest mice live in areas of dense pickleweed, which provides ample hiding places from natural predators, such as hawks, owls, herons, and clapper rails. During very high tides, water covers the pickleweed, and the mice must either swim or climb onto plants that grow above the high tide line. For this reason, salt marsh harvest mice are very good swimmers and climbers, but they also depend on the bushy vegetation that rings Bay wetlands.

Salt marsh harvest mice live very short lives—most live less than 8 months, but they can live as long as one year. Unlike most rodents, they do not reproduce quickly: females bear only about four young per litter, and have only one litter in
