1. The East of Bayshore CCC shall elect 6 persons to OICW' Board of Directors at a public election on Friday, June 2. 1967, at 8pm at the Ravenswood High School J building. 2. All target area residents who have passed their 18th birthday may vote.

3. Each resident desiring to vote must sign his name and address at the time he picks up his ballot.

4. Nominations may be made by any elegible voter.

5. There is not limit to the number of people who may be nominated; however, the nomination must be acceptable to the one nominated, and that person whould be willing and available to attend meetings regularly.

6. Each elegible voter mayvote for as many as six positions to be filled.

7. At the appropriate time, the ballots should be filled in and placed in a ballot box. Only official ballots will be accepted. Absentee and proxy votes will not be accepted.

8. The six persons receiving the most votes (plurality) are declared elected. In case of a tie for filling the last position, a stand up vote by the elegible voters will determine the winner.

Ravenswood Elementary School District have come under more and more attack--not from Mothers for Equal Education, but from TEE (Taxpayers for Elementary Education).

The criticism was not destructive in nature, but part of the constant searching for some solution to black educational problems. All of this effort had been to help the school distirct help our black children -the result of these efforts suggest the vastness of the communication gap between black and white.

The effort sof the Day School were primarily designed to help high school students. The call was sent out to parents of high school students. More parents of elementary school children responded than high school parents. This response indicates that the parents felt the need of additional education for their children. The school was an alternative to a student boycott -- the idea being that if schooling is what the children need, we will give them some supplementary edication. Apparently the Day School has created as much pressure as would have been created by a school boycott.

It cannot be overstressed at this point that all efforts were positive. There was the tendancy to try and get along with the elementary school district because: 1) It was trying hard(so it seemed), 2) It is not wise to engage in battle on two fronts. Any real pressure felt by the RESD was more internal than external -- that is, guilt feelings.



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Opportunities Industrialization Center West now offers two more courses of training with high potential employment upon completion of the vocational training. The new courses fall within the area of Marketing and Merchand sing; Grocer Checker and Relail selling. The short story that accompanies the development of Marketing and Merchandising course at OICW exemplifies thre true beauty of the "self-help" concept. OICW was faced with a situation of having a community request for this vocation in numbers. OICWdid not have the funds to initiate or support only alternative OICW had, was to take their "self concept" on which it was founded, and go to industry and state their "purpose and cause."

Mr.Chester Bailey, Manager of Operations, designated the job of co-prdinating this new course to this writer, a welding instructor with OICW.

With a positive nod and a plea from the needy I went to the Marketing and Merchandising Industry for help in developing a Marketing and Merchandising division of training for OICW. Call were made on the corporation divisions of Penney's Stores, National Cash Register, Safeway Stores Inc., Monroe Sweda Business Machines, Macy's, Purity Stores Inc., Emporium, F.W. Woolworths, All American Markets and anyone else who would lend an ear.

Because of the long chains of command that exist within the structures of large corporations, it seemed for awhile that only token response would be received. But as the approvals for donations began to come through the corporation ranks, OICW was annointed with a miracle that had a blessing as a halo.

Calls began to come in asking when could the equipment be delivered? or "When can someone come to pick up the equipment we have for OICW's Retail Sales Class?" Response such as mentioned above has not been taken lightly or for granted by those at OJCW, this kind of interest on the part of industy is a strong incentive to aid the warriors against poverty at OICW, as they fight the heavy tide of unemplyed created by the mastering might of automation, which invariable is taking jobs from those who are unskilled.

The Marketing and Merchandising course at OICW is now accepting and training students. From the standpoint of equipment, there are still things to be desired, but the program is underway. and half of the battle is won.

The philosophy of Dr. Sullivan's "self-help" concept is probably the answer to America's job placement problem for the socio-economically deprived, all that is needed is for the program to be implemented in other poverty stricken and socio-economically deprived areas.


