Lectures, productions scheduled during Black Liberation Month

"Black Projections: Past Reflections" is the theme of Black Liberation Month, to be held during February at Stanford University.

Lectures by black politicians and scholars, dramatic productions, films and parties are among the events planned for the observance.

Highlight of the month will be a symposium on "A Black as a Presidential Candidate in 1984," to be held Friday, Feb. 24, at 7 p.m. in Annenberg Auditorium. Panelists will include State Assemblyman Willie Brown, D-San Francisco; state Senator Diane Watson, D-Los Angeles; and Stanford professors Condoleezza Rice and Henry Walker. Tresidder Union Program Coordinator Keith Archuleta will be the moderator. A reception will follow in Ujamaa Lounge.

Other events will include a play entitled "Spell No. 7" by playwright Ntozake Shange, which will be presented Feb. 1 to 4 and Feb. 8 to 11 at 8 p.m. in the Nitory in the Old Union. Tickets will be on sale at Tresidder ticket office and at the door.

The Black Student Union will host a panel discussion on "Blacks in Struggle: Focus on Grenada" Friday at 6:30 p.m. in the East Palo Alto City Council building. Panelists will include Oba Simba T'Shaka, professor of black studies at San Francisco State University; Willia Gray, professor of social work education at San Francisco State; Percy Henson, professor of Afro-American studies at the University of California at Berkeley; and Omowale Satterwhite, East Palo Alto City Council member.

The panel discussion and the following dinner are open to the public without charge.

The Stanford East African Relief Organization will hold a fund-raising party Saturday, Feb. 11, at 8 p.m. in the Fort Mason Center, San Francisco. Music will be provided by the Nyala Band from Ethiopia. Admission is \$8.

The Stanford Gospel Choir will present a winter concert Sunday, Feb. 12, at 2:30 p.m. in Kresge Auditorium. Admission is \$2.

A dramatization of the lives of black educator Mary McLeod Bethune and women's activist Mother Jones will be presented Monday, Feb. 13, at 7 p.m. in Annenberg Auditorium. A reception will follow at Bechtel International Center.

A daylong program on "Celebrating Black/African History," will be held from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 18, at the Youth Services Center, 2400 Ralmar Ave., East Palo Alto. The event is sponsored by Kappa Alpha Fraternity and the Women of Nairobi.

"The Spook That Sat By The Door," a film about a black member of the Secret Service, will be shown Monday, Feb. 20, at 7 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. in Cubberley Auditorium. Admission is \$2 (general) and \$1.50 (students).

A special Black Liberation Month program for senior citizens will be held Monday, Feb. 27, at 7:30 p.m. in East Palo Alto's Runnymede Gardens.

The final event of the month will be a farewell party for the associate dean of student affairs, Thom Massey, Wednesday, Feb. 29, at 4:30 p.m. in the Governor's Corner Elliot Program Center.

Throughout February, there will be an exhibit in the Tresidder lobby of portraits by Earl Black entitled "We Are All Africans."
