

The Past . .

Founded in 1865, the Redwood City Library began as a Town reading room located on Main Street. In 1900 the Town Trustees levied a special library tax and a free public library was established in Redwood City.

Under the direction of Laura Barton, the first City Librarian, a "Carnegie Library" was constructed on the southwest corner of Middlefield and Broadway. Damaged in the 1906 earthquake before it was a year old, the library was totally rebuilt with additional Carnegie Foundation funds.

The appointment of Wilhelmina Harper as Head Librarian in 1930 brought an impressive growth in books and patronage, leading to the construction of a new library in 1939 at the corner of Jefferson and Middlefield.

With the post-war growth of population, the concept of branch libraries was implemented: the Friendly Acres Branch operated in a room at Fire Station No. 3 from 1952 to 1960; the Schaberg Branch opened in 1957; the Fair Oaks Branch, specializing in service to the Spanish-speaking community, was completed in 1974.

By the time Karl Vollmayer was appointed City librarian in 1960, the library was once again experiencing space problems. Crowded conditions forced the storage of over 25,000 books and the dispersal of library offices and services to several buildings. In 1985 plans were prepared for a new 45,000 sq. ft. building on the site of the old Fire Station No. 1. By retaining the facade of the fire station, the library thus incorporates the old and the new, and sets a fine example of how Redwood City's colorful past promises a progressive future.
