# Ravenswood Schools Continue Free Meals

Ravenswood City School District recently announced the continuation of a free meal policy for school children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the National School Lunch Program and Breakfast programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size-income criteria for use in determining eligibility.

For the family size of 1, the monthly gross income will be \$0 to \$228. (Family size of one means a pupil who is his sole support, such as a foster child.

For a family of 2, income will

For a family of 2, income will be \$0 to 300; family of 3, \$0 to \$372; family of 4, \$0 to \$443; family of 5, \$0 to \$508; family of 6, \$0 to \$574; family of 7, \$0 to \$633; and for a family of 8, \$0 to \$693.

\$53 is added for each additional family member.

Children from families whose income is at or below that shown are eligible for meals free. In addition, families not meeting this criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30% of income, special education expenses due to the mental or

physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are

urged to apply.

They may do so by filling in the application forms to be sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligi-

bility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has such children living with them and wishes to apply for meals for them, they should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provision of the policy the Principal of each school will review applications and determine eligibility.

If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal he may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent, Mr. Warren Hayman, whose address is 2160 Euclid Avenue, East Palo Alto, CA 94303, for a hearing to appeal the decision. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent, where it may be reviewed by any interested party.

tains that the intelligence quotients of Blacks are inferior to those of Whites. Professor Jensen, along with a colleague, Professor Shockley of Stanford University, argues that the higher a Black's I.Q. the greater the amount of "White" genes he possesses.

Students of the Nairobi Schools located in this East Bayshore Community are a vivid refutation of these poor men's confused projections. These students are living testimony that Black children can learn and excel inside the Black community, and, they do this without those "White" genes of which Jensen and Shockley are so fond.
