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Department of Housing and Urban Development Grant Application

East Palo Alto Technical Assistance Proposal

The City of East Palo Alto, California, submits the grant application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for funding of Technical Assistance. With funds from federal resources this effort will operate in close partnership with public and private entities to develop and implement a set of innovative strategies for overcoming the chief barriers which have retarded and in some instances inhibited the city in carrying out effective Housing and Economic Development efforts.

We are requesting \$1.2 million for two years. The city has approximately 7,000 residents at or below the poverty level, out of a population of approximately 18,700 (1980 census data; current estimates are 26,000 in population). The median income is approximately \$14,000 per year.

Proposal for Technical Assistance Funds

While investors recognize the area as potentially ripe for development due to the economically underutilized real estate, the city, itself, suffers drastically from insufficient financial resources to efficiently address its residents' needs of providing jobs, housing and other essential city services.

With the benefit of technical assistance, the city will be able to continue its ambitious redevelopment program which will address some of the needs of the community.

It is proposed that technical assistant funds be used to support the planning and implementation efforts for the City's Housing Department.

Due to the low tax base, the City of East Palo Alto is only able to provide a minimum of services. A city with commitments, there are two main areas of focus: increasing the tax base and establishing a community-wide base of quality affordable housing.

Recently, the city created a Housing Agency with the capability to create a solid foundation of housing programs and policies, the use of technical assistance funds will allow the city the ability to carry-out the goals of providing affordable housing by aiding in the planning, development and administering of the Housing Department program.

The following tasks are anticipated to be completed as a result of the Technical Assistance:

- The preparation of, and instruction, in survey materials and survey conduct to determine vacant and underutilized land that could be purchased with CDBG funds for use in meeting City and County Housing Assistance Plan needs for low and moderate income families.
- 2. The development of, and instruction in implementation of, a coordinated use of housing codes with present and potential CDBG funded lower income neighborhood improvements.
- 3. The development of, and instruction in new approaches to rehabilitation and replacement of housing to maximize the use of Title I funds, including approaches to leverage private and other public investment.
- 4. The preparation of, and means of distributing, materials designed to increase participation in the City's Business Incubation program which will utilize CDBG funds as eligible for economic development activities, and the training and orientation of both City staff, non-profit development corporation staff and boards, and local business interests in the use of available funds for economic development.
- 5. The use of outside expertise to assist in such technical areas as environmental review, relocation, land acquisition, the review of developer proposals and the leveraging of private investment and local tax dollars in support of specific sites acquired with the assistance of CDBG funds to create local job and tax revenue opportunities.
- 6. The design of, and instruction in the operation of, workshops, seminars and conferences for youth counseling through a proposed youth memorial neighborhood center to be funded at least in part by CDBG funds.
- 7. In cooperation with the HUD San Francisco office staff, the identification of necessary skills and solicitation of technical assistance support from outside the community.

To insure that the city adequately addresses the goals as set forth in the tasks that have previously been identified, the city will seek to qualify all contracted assistance through a process that includes advice form the HUD regional office in San Francisco. We would hope and expect that they would help and work closely with the city on the use of the funds once allocated.

The funds in our estimation will be used to meet not only the community goals and objectives, but also the national objectives by benefitting the low and moderate income persons; as well as, aiding in the prevention or elimination of slum blight.

Dear Mr. Hall,

Following discussions with, and review of information received from representatives of the City of East Palo Alto, strong consideration is being given to a \$50,000 grant to aid in the establishment and operation of a City Housing Department. This grant would be available from an anonymous private donor who would like to help the City to set up an effective housing program, using to full advantage funding to be available from redevelopment tax revenues and other governmental and private sources. The donor and the Foundation recognize that early, focused efforts of a capable Housing Director and staff are necessary to assure that the housing improvements funded and stimulated by the planned redevelopment projects will produce major benefits for the City's present and future residents.

It is our understanding that the City Council has approved the establishment of a Housing Department, contingent upon availability of funding, and we realize that funds in addition to the possible grant will be needed for full operation of the department. We are willing to consider approval of this grant prior to the availability of full funding so that recruitment of a Director can begin at an early date.

Before we proceed in this direction, we would like to have assurance that the concept, organization and role of the Housing Department continues to have the wholehearted support of the City Council. We will welcome an indication of this support together with a formal request for a grant.

We are aware that the tax increment revenues expected from the redevelopment projects will start to generate in several years. The
