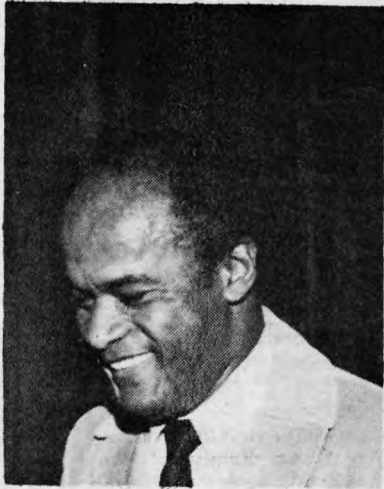

Community Music School Plans Festival

A new kind of music recital is being planned at the Community Music School, 2442 University Avenue.

Instead of the traditional 2-3 hour recital made up of proud parents, bored children and nervous instructors, James Samuels, head of the school, has scheduled an entire afternoon and evening of activities open to members of the community.

The Music and Art Festival begins at 3 p.m. June 10 and will be held at 2201 University Avenue in East Palo Alto. In addition to the staple recitals, there will be an international buffet style dinner and an art exhibit put on by the Palo Alto Art Club and Black artists from the Bay Area. Donations for the dinner are \$1.00, and for children under 12, \$.75. At 6 p.m. there will be an evening program including advanced students of the school, the Stanford String Quartet, The Peninsula Chorus, and soloists from the San Francisco Opera Workshop. A \$1,000 Kohler piano and electric guitar will be raffled off. Donations for the raffle are \$2.00.

music and allied arts. Samuels would like to develop a music school that the community can be proud of simply because it offers "good" musical instruction.

The school currently has an enrollment of over 100 but only about 50 come from the East Palo Alto-East Menlo Park Area.

"I would teach a dog to sing if that dog had potential. The school is open to all people everywhere," said Samuels.

Summer classes, which begin June 18, include an "Introduction to Art and Music" class for 3-6 year olds, a class in music theory, and various other classes in piano, voice, organ, guitar, violin, cello, viola, brass instruments, and drums. Individual lessons are \$16 a month and class instruction is \$10 a month. Financial aid is available.

Coming from various areas, Samuels' instructors include a graduate student from Stanford University, an accredited teacher, and even a former pupil of the Community Music School.

At present, the music school is busy organizing the upcoming summer program, as well as trying to keep up with the every day work and business around the building. Much help is needed physically as well as financially.

Samuels and one of his instructors are also interested in organizing an orchestra in the community and having more people try out for the concert choir.

Ravenswood Seniors Win Scholarships

Two Ravenswood seniors have been awarded full scholarships to college. Diane Triplett has been awarded a scholarship to Mills College and a California State Scholarship. 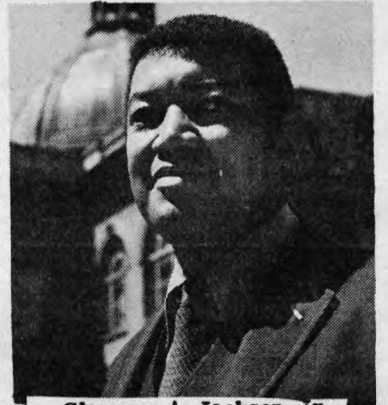
National Award For EPA Council

"Warhoop" Willy Davis Succumbs in Palo Alto

The Legendary "Warhoop" Willie Davis, one of the area's authentic Black Cowboys, passed away Monday morning May 28, 1973, at Stanford Hospital. Davis, 71, had been recovering from a long illness when stricken Sunday evening at his East Palo Alto home. He was rushed to the hospital where death came in the early morning hours of the next day.

He leaves many friends to mourn his passing, particularly the young children of the area who had long been accustomed to his astounding tales of the West and his feats of rope-twirling and 'bronc riding.'

Local services were held at the Palm O'Dell Mortuary, 935 Industrial Avenue, Palo Alto Wednesday, May 30, 1973. Further services will be held in St. Louis, Mo. at the E. B. Koonce Funeral Home. Surviving are: Mrs. Catherine William and Eugene Kirk of St. Louis, Mrs. Mamie McCoy, Mrs. Elva Washington, Solomon Kirk and William Kirk all of this area, a host of neices and nephews, 15 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren.
