

In 1861, while the American Civil War raged to the north, Mexico was visited by a contingent of European (French, Spanish, and British) military forces seeking financial settlement of Mexico's \$800 million foreign debt. Though the French were not acutally driven from Mexican soil until 1867, Cinco de Mayo, May 5, 1862, saw the defeat of the French Imperial forces at Puebla, near Mexico City. Against overwhelming odds, the Mexican Army of the newly independent Mexican Republic led by General Zaregoza, railled with the support of Native Indians. This Mexican victory has come to symbolize the nation's ultimately successful resistance to the French Intervention.

Each year on the 5th of May, Mexican-Americans celebrate this great national holiday, marking the battle when a ragged little Mexican army defeated the superior forces of Napoleon III and drove a foreign power from the continent. The holiday is meaningful for all Americans because, since then, no foreign nation has dared to invade these shores.
