

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As We See It:

Ravenswood Rec District Does Well with Little

The Ravenswood Recreation and Park District, formed years ago to fill a crying need for playgrounds and recreation in East Palo Alto, is starting the New Year just a little bit smaller than it was before.

The disannexation of the Byers court area—recently annexed to Menlo Park—will actually occur on Jan. 30 so that it'll be removed from the district's tax rolls for 1961-62.

No one argues against disannexation. Keeping the area in the recreation district while it's also a part of Menlo Park would be out-and-out double taxation.

But the action points up the fact that the recreation district, which in our opinion has done a fine job in plugging East Palo Alto's recreation gap, faces more constriction in the future.

If annexations continue, the day will come—perhaps a goodly number of years in the future and perhaps sooner—when the district won't have enough assessed value to continue operation.

Mrs. Ralph Blom, the district supervisor, tells us that the district is not planning any more expansion of facilities—but will concentrate on applying finishing touches to facilities now in existance and doing maintenance work.

She also noted that, although district assessed value drops each time there's a disannexation, some recovery is made by natural tax base growth within the unincorporated area. And, Mrs. Blom said, the district's recreation program has actually been increasing in the number and kind of activities.

This fact, in our opinion, shows that this district is continuing to do the excellent work which it has done in the past—and with decreased income.

Mrs. Blom points out that the district is not in immediate danger of closing doors. There still remains a considerable body of unincorporated area

But if ever the district is forced to disband, it will be a distinct loss to the area. There'll be tax savings for one and all, to be sure, but the lack of recreation in the unincorporated area will more than offset the "gain".

Gillespie Moves From Area, Leaves Rec Post

Four-year member William Gillespie announced his resignation last week from the Rav enswood Recreation and Park District board of directors.

Gillespie has moved to San Carles "in order to be closer to my work. I will remember with pleasure my association with the district."

His announcement was made at the February directors meeting. The board accepted it "with deep regret" and thanked Gillespie for his service.

Gillespie's term will end next November. Directors announced they will begin a search for an appointee. They said they welcomed applica-

On May 29, public hearing and final budget adoption is scheduled.

The \$201,100 budget request for federal funds was determined after a four-month study of the 1,800-acre East Palo Alto-East Menlo Park by the Community Council.

It took no account of the nineman police district established by the county board of supervisors this week, a force which council members lauded.

The council's findings include

". . . Community agencies and institutions exist to meet the needs."

The area strangely has a strength of unity because it is isolated from other communities by Bayshore Freeway, San f Francisquito Creek, and San Francisco Bay-a unifying factor which nonetheless is a detriment because "the lack of public transportation and low in-come help confine residents to the manmade island" . . . and "many children are growing up unaware of the world west of Bayshore."

CENSUS DATA

According to the 1960 census, "east-of-Bayshore, in contrast with San Mateo County, had a younger population with more children, lower income level, more working parents with preschool children, more unemployed, a lower educational level, and a large Negro population.'

About a third of the area's 17,800 population is Negro, compared to the rest of the county which has only a 3 per cent Negro population.

The area has one-twentieth of the county's total population, yet it has nearly one-third of the total aid to needy children (ANC) welfare cases - "approximately 10 per cent of the families east of Bayshore re-ceive ANC funds."

This "large ANC caseload is only one indication of lack of family cohesiveness" because there is "cultural deprivation of parents" and a "high incidence of venereal disease among teenagers" and the "numerous unwed young mothers.'

The entire day was spent with the youngsters having the time of their lives for pennies.


By 2:30, the sno cone booth was closed — a popular sell-out. The coke, orange and root beer went next and the popcorn and hot dogs completely





The Commission met with the fired director of the Readiness Program Robert Hoover, and then with college administration people. Both sides had become "pretty polarized," according to Phyl Blum, but weekend meetings with the two groups began to bring response. As the COUNTRY ALMANAC goes to press, Robert Hoover has been offered a new post as assistant for minority programs on the three campuses of the college district. Formerly he had headed a tutorial program on the College of San Mateo campus.

Still unresolved is the future of Jean Wirth of Woodside, who has been on the English faculty of College of San Mateo for the past nine years, but who has been working with the Readiness Program for the last three years, the past year as Hoover's assistant.

"She is a tenured member of the faculty and her status will be handled separately," according to the college's public relations director, John Hubbard. She had been meeting with administration officials in discussions of her future status. If she is reassigned to her former role as an English teacher she can't begin work until February when the new semester begins, according to Hubbard.

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The Commission, which got off to a jackrabbit start with the College of San Mateo crisis, will be keeping an eye on future developments there as well as building background for dealing with other potential

problems in the county.

"Young people need to feel very sure someone is listening," said Mr. "Not only listening, but seriously considering what they are Forrest. saying."

He credits much of the Commission's success in dealing with the Col lege of San Mateo problem to the members' willingness to listen, even to expressions of anger, and to give straightforward answers to all concerned.

"They never said, 'We have this under consideration.' They always reported what they had been doing and what they were planning specifically to do," he said. "Both sides knew we were not coming with axes. We were not suspect."



RRPD Plans 'South Sea Island Summer'

"South Sea Island Summer," the Ravenswood Recreation and Park District's 1965 summer program, will begin on Monday, June 28.

The nine-week calendar of events, designed to keep the restless small fry out of mother's hair for the next two months, will include scheduled activities at four supervised playgrounds.

The playgrounds will cater to children between the ages of 6 and 12 and will include the Recreation Center gymnasium, Kavanaugh School playground, Brentwood School playground and Jack Farrell in University village.

In addition, the gym at Ravenswood High School will be open to youths who are 13 years of age or over.

Play will be supervised, but there will be greater freedom to select the games and sports to be organized.

For the younger set, the South Sea Island Summer" will have a unified program each week, ranging from "Discovery Week!" which begins on June 28, through "Searching for Pearls" and "Squals and Rainbows" week, and finally to "Sunset Week" during the final days of August.

Youngsters who wish to participate in the program may obtain registration cards by having a registration slip_signed by their parents. This form will enable the child to check out equipment at the playground.

Although there is no registration fee, if a

registration card is lost there will be a five cent fine to replace it.

The program calls for new crafts, games and stories to be introduced each week, with a special contest, tournament or activity scheduled for Thursdays.

"Discovery Week," (June 28--July 2) RRPD leaders will feature the construction of paper hats as the new craft and "Animal Confusion" as the game.

That Thursday's special activity will be a scavenger funt, with the group dividing into four teams and scouring the playground for various pre-selected items.

During the first week, the adult leaders will give the youngsters under their supervision a chance of apply for positions as "Junior Leaders." The applicants must be between the ages of 9 and 12, and those chosen will aid the program leaders in coordinating the activities for one of the weeks during the summer.

The "Pee Wee Baseball" program will also begin during "Discovery Week." This activity will represent an attempt to teach seven-and eight year-old children the fundamentals of the game. Adult leaders will teach the aspiring ballplayers the basic rules of the game, as well as how to throw, catch, hit, run bases and play the various positions.

The "Pee Wee Ball" program will be held

for one hour each week at three play grounds. It will be conducted at Brentwood on Mondays, at Kavanaugh on Tuesdays and Farrell Park on Wednesdays.

Each instruction session will be held from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m.

A special benefit of the program will be a free swim in the Recreation District Pool on Saturday, July 3, from 10 to 11:30 a.m. Only youngsters who have registered at one of the playgrounds will be permitted to swim.

The special Thursday activities include a number of competitive activities, including relay races, a bike regatta, a penny carnival and a treasure hunt.

Finally, representatives of all four playgrounds will gather at the Recreation Department Gym on Thursday, August 19 for the Annual Tournament of Champions.

Each playground will send contestants to take part in eight events, including four-square, tetherball, Paddle pool, checkers, chess, jacks, basketball-golf and wiffle ball.

Other special events planned for the summer include several slumber nights, a playground cookout, and a watermelon feed.

Copies of the summer program which describes all the activities sponsored by the Park District this summer will be available at the District office on June 18.

RRPD To Oppose Use Permit

The Ravenswood Recreation and Park District Board of Directors voted unanimously Tuesday night to oppose the Community House application for a use permit at 555 Bell Street.

In the same motion, the Board vowed to appeal the matter to the County Board of Supervisors if a use permit is granted at today's Planning Commission in Redwood City.

The Recreation District maintains that there is already considerable traffic congestion on Bell street and that another public meeting spot would only aggravate the situation.

"As it is now," explained District Superintendent Yolanda Blom, "a well-attended activity results in cars being parked on both sides of the street for the length of the block. The addition of Community House and its many meetings and programs would create an impossible situation."

In the same meeting, however, the Board granted Earl Robertson, youth director at the Community House, permission to organize a dance for the Marvenians Social Club in the Recreation Center gymnasium, provided he finds "a suable entity" to co-sponsor the affair.

The Recreation Board also stipulated that the co-sponsors for the dance first obtain the necessary dance permit from the County Sheriff's Department and that all rules and regulations of the District be observed.

In other business, the Board heard a report from Mrs. Blom on the University Avenue landscaping project.

The County Board of Supervisors agreed several months ago to provide landscaping on the University Avenue medians if the Ravenswood Recreation District would provide maintenance for it.

The District agreed to provide such maintenance if "a sprinkling system with an automatic timer were installed" and "if the district were con-

In correspondence with Mrs. Blom last week, the County Engineer's office offered to install hose outlets at a cost to the county of \$2200.

The Engineer's office told Mrs. Blom that manually operated sprinklers would cost the District an extra \$3000, while an automatic sprinkling system would cost more than \$4500.

Board member Mrs. John F. Partanen charged that the county had "acted in bad faith" and that "we have a right to insist on the provisions to which all parties originally agreed."

The Board also gave final approval to a proposal to lease a five-acre parcel of land from the East Palo Alto Sanitary District for one dollar a year.

The piece of land is located west of Larkspur Drive between O'Connor and Beech Streets.

The five-acre site is mostly marshland and would require extensive filling before it could be utilized for recreational pur-

poses.

Mrs. Blom indicated that the use of the new site would be dictated by recreational demands in the new few years.

In her Superintendent's report, Mrs. Blom indicated that an increase in absessed evaluation of about 30 percent may allow the Recreation District to operate "in the black" for the first time in 10 years.

The Board has been dipping into its reserve fund for about \$6,000 a year for the past decade.

The recent property tax reassessment in San Mateo County accounts for about half of the 30 percent increase, while new taxable structures within the district furnishes the basis for the other half.

the Recreation District and community Church.

Both bodies maintain that there is already considerable traffic congestion on the street and that another public meeting spot would only aggravate the situation.

"As it is now," says Community Church Pastor Herbert Baker, "when there is a night meeting at the recreation center, cars can bearly thread their way up and down the street."

Rev. Baker also objects on the grounds that "two churches with such diverse approaches should not be located on the same block."

The Community House draws its principal support from Presbyterian Churches in Menlo Park and Palo Alto.

Baker maintains that these sources of support require that Community House be classified as a Presbyterian Church group, and not as a philanthropical organization.

"In our church," explains Rev. Baker, "Civil rights is not an issue. We believe that the church is only for the worship of God and that politics only results in disrupting divisions."

"If the Community House is a church movement, and if it is an agency for the promotion of civil rights, then we don't want it next door to us. It is simply unethical to place two such opposing churches so close to one another."

Recreation District officials also object to the Community House philosophy? considering youth activities.

The Community House believes that the teen-agers who attend the center should be allowed to establish the regulations that guide their behavior.

Recreation officials and many residents protest that it is this philosphy that contributed to considerable rowdiness and law enforcement problems last summer.

Community House officials discontinued the program of teen-age activities after a number of complaints had been received, but recreation officials and many residents fear that the Community House may try to reinstitute them across the street from the closely-supervised Recreation Center.

The Rev. Smith believes that such objections are not valid.

"To be truthful," explains Rev. Smith, "we do not even think of the Bell Street location as a programming center. We envision it primarily as office space and as a place in which we may hold small group and committee meetings.

"Any large teen-age program would not be held at our central headquarters, unless we could obtain adequate space that would enable effective separation of offices and activities.

"Our teen-age problem last summer ran into a little trouble when it drew some teen-agers that were diffucult to control.

"Now they believe that since it happen before we will let it happen again.

"Last summer's experience has left a bad impression in some people's minds, especially those who do not want to face up to the teen-age issue.

"I don't know how to argue effectively with these complaints," admits Rev. Smith. "Whenever you deal with teenagers you can expect some controversy over the rules of the game."


In any case, Rev. Smith does

not feel that these differences in approach are proper matters to be brought before the planning commission.

He hopes that Friday night's meeting will permit the protestors and other interested residents to discuss the matter in an unemotional atmosphere.

"We invite all those who have either objections or suggestions to come and share them with us at the meeting," he explains.

"We hope that anyone who has an opinion to express--be it critical or otherwise--will attend and enable us to make the wisest decision possilbe."

Hearing on Community House Application Set For Nov. 10

Wednesday, Oct. 27, 1965 Ravenswood Post, East Palo Alto, Calif.

Community House has made formal application for a use permit at 2369 University Ave. (the former Bruce Realty Office), making inevitable a clash with the Bayshore Businessmen's Betterment Association before the County Planning Commission.

The BBBA maintains that the location of Community House in a commercially zoned area "will substantially depreciate property values" and "will reduce the marketability of the adjacent property, making it difficult to get new firms to locate" in the area.

The BBBA expressed these sentiments in a letter to the Community House Board of Directors late last month when itlearned of Community House's interest in the property.

Since then, Community House Director Carl A. Smith has obtained the support of his financial backers and has made an agreement to purchase the property providing he can obtain a use permit from the County Planning Commission.

A public hearing on the matter will be held before the planning commission on Nov. 10.

Community House is being

forced to move from its present 1590 Bay Road location because Duca and Hanley (King's) Market must expand its parking facilities.

The market, which has been leasing the Bay Road structure to Community House for about 2-1/2 years, will lose a number of parking places because of the project to widen University Avenue.

Community House has been searching for a new location since last spring, but has run into varying degrees of opposition each time it tries to make a move.

The most vehement protests were registered by the Ravenswood Recreation and Park District and the East Palo Alto Community Church when Community House applied for a use permit at a lot adjacent to them last July.

This application represented the first case under the policy governing charitable and philanthropic institutions.

A formal public hearing was never held, however, because

Rev. Smith was unable to obtain sufficent parking at the 555 Bell St. location.

While there have been few instances of overt opposition to Community House since its establishment in East Palo Alto in early 1963, there has been some disenchantment about the organization's accomplishments and many of its activities.

Perhaps the most persistent charge is that Community House tends to promote a poor image of East Palo Alto in the area

west of Bayshore.

"In order to justify its existence in the community to its financial backers, it must continually prove that the area east of Bayshore is in need of help," explained one businessman. "And when Community House continually cites statistics that point up the high crime rate, the high incidence of low income families, the large number of people on welfare, and the large number of residents who are unemployed, it is only natural that those who live and

work here become disgusted."

Mrs. Ida Berk, one of the leading civil rights leaders in the area, believes that these statistics are especially resented by Negro residents.

"When Negroes move to East Palo Alto from the South or from slums in the city, they are coming here with the idea that this is a clean and attractive area--one that is healthy for their children to grow up in. They are not at all interested in being identified as the source of most sensationalistic crime

and poverty in the county."
Ed Becks, another leading civil rights leader, supports Mrs. Berk's beliefs. "People in East Palo Alto simply do not think of themselves as being in a poor situation. People who have come here from the South from the slums feel they have moved up.

"When a group of outsiders tries to tell them that they have not moved up, they do not logically endear themselves to the community," concludes Becks.

Community House Director

Rev. Smith has heard these complaints before, but maintains that he has never seen any specific examples of the disparaging publicity which allegedly emanates from Community House.

"It is simply impossible to react to these charges unless I can be shown concrete instances in which Community House has tended to promote a poor image of the area."

House, believe that the opposite situation exists-that, in fact, Community House works to eliminate the unattractive image of East Palo Alto that has developed west of Bayshore.

"One of our prime goals," explained one member of the Ministry, "is to go back to our own communities on the other side of the freeway and try to destroy the false image of East Palo Alto that has evolved.

Perhaps the most widespread opposition to Community results from a fear that it will attempt to re-institute a youth program for "hard-to-reach" teenagers.

Such a program was tried in summer, 1964, and the resulting rowdiness and law enforcement problems forced Community House officials to discontinue the project.

Rev. Smith admits that this program caused considerable difficulty while it lasted, but maintains that such a program will not be sponsored by Community House.

"All decisions concerning teenage programs of this nature will now be made by the East Palo Alto Youth Board--an independent group of Peninsula residents for which Community House serves only as the fiscal agent," he says.

"In any case, we are not planning to establish a neighborhood house; nor do we envision ourselves as a program center. The only facilities that intend to establish are offices for the Midpeninsula christian Ministry." A number of residents believe that, despite the accompanying disturbances, the "teenage drop-in" program was the most successful that Community House ever established.

Harry Bremond, an attorney who is also active in the local civil rights movement, believes that the program should be revived. "There is simply no where in the community for these teenagers to go. Community House made the only successful attempt to reach them."

Bremond believes that those who oppose Community House on the basis of its youth program are relying on "a false issue."

He is supported by Mrs. Vernon Wallace, president of the Ravenswood High Parent-Teachers Association.

"Community House provided the one place where the average teenager could go and feel as if he were really accepted."

"Since the Community House program folded, there has been no place for them to go--they are left to wander in the streets," she concludes.

Neither Ed Becks nor Ida Berk considers themselves opponents of Community House, but both think that the organization has failed in its mission east of Bayshore.

"As far as I am concerned," says Becks, "to be discussing Community House at this time is to be doing Monday morning quarterbacking."

"Community House's program failed because of its inability to predict the nature, character and images of the very people it was trying to serve," explains Becks.

He believes that one of the major reasons for failure is "its inner-directed orientation."

"When Community House first came into the community more than two years ago, it was to be an organization in which all groups and organizations participated. The goal was for Community House to become broader and more encompassing. Instead it became narrower and more centralized as the program of the Midpeninsula Christian Ministry and not a program of all the religious and fraternal organizations in the community."

Mrs. Berk described Community House's method of operation as "talking with community leaders to find out what they wanted and then initiating the program without letting them play a role in its implementation."

"All decisions were made by the organization itself. Then the people were invited in and told what was going to be done for them."

Rev. Smith emphatically denies that this situation has existed. "It has been quite the contrary," he asserts. "Community House has always stood for the right of people to decide their own destinies."



BE A CONSERVATIONST!

When a vandal comes out for a night on the town, you can never tell what his target for the occasion might be or what tools he will bring along to complete the project. We use vandal in the singular because it is inconceivable that some acts could have possibly been committed without the benefit of strictest privacy. There are some things, after all, that should shame a man even to admit to himself.

Vandalism is demonstrated in various forms and aspects, some more repulsive than others and some more vicious. Take for instance "rest room art." Included in this category are the crudest attempts at pornography and the vilest of obscenities, usually daubed on walls with some unremovable stain or finger painted in unmentionable media.

Then there is the frenetic vandal. This type comes armed with sledge hammer, saw and crowbar with which he reduces rest room fixtures, drinking fountains, doors and fences to rubble.

In some instances vandalism isn't easy by any means . . . chopping down trees that are at least 30 feet tall and over six inches in diameter or driving cars around on lawns and breaking bottle against basketball standards, sand lot equipment and black top areas.

Puzzling also is the fact that noise of cars spinning around on the lawn, the hacking, chopping and crash of timber and the shattering of glass attracts no attention. At least these incidents are never reported.

The most costly vandalism has occurred to the street trees along University Avenue. Forty trees were destroyed last year and replaced. Now the Ravenswood Recreation and Park District is confronted with the cost of 47 more trees that were deliberately broken by vandals,

How can someone destroy these trees without being seen? The street is well lighted and carries a considerable amount of traffic throughout the day and night, yet no one has reported seeing these childish acts of destruction committed. The replacement of street trees alone along University Avenue will cost approximately \$450!

Citizens of this community must work together to preserve the beauty and appearance of our community to ourselves as well as to visitors. Everywhere around us we can see the natural beauty of the area turning into a maze of asphalt and cement. We must develop a conservation attitude now, in order to keep the trees, shrubs, flowers and lawns from being completely eliminated.

The Ravenswood Recreation and Park District, as one who is dedicated to preserving this natural beauty, asks and needs the help of each and every individual in curtailing the destructiveness of a small portion of the public that emerges from under rocks after dark

BCRA Sponsors Movies

Saturday mornings at the movies are in store for East Palo Alto youngsters who take advantage of a new Black Community Relations Association (B.C.R.A.) program. The group has arranged to show movies (cartoons, comedies and children's adventures tales)

each Saturday at 9 a.m. at the Ravenswood Recreation Center.

The choice of movies is aimed at five to 12-year-olds.

Children under 12 will be charged 25 cents; those over 12, 35 cents.

The first movies were shown Saturday.

The children's movie program evolved from the B.C.R.A.'s long range goal of developing a combined movie theater-cultural center. Although East Palo Alto has a population of 33,000, says Nathan Robinson who is head of the movie project, "there is no movie theater, no bowling alley—and very few traditional entertainment sources."

theater-cultural center would serve both as a general entertainment complex and as a vehicle for recognizing and developing local talent in all art forms — painting, sculpture, dancing, handicraft, writing, cinematography and others,"

he added.

The B.C.R.A. hopes to extend its movie program to Friday-night showings for area teenagers. However, financial limitations prevent the group from ordering more movies at the present time. The Ravenswood Recreation Centers has already made its facilities available for the program.

By establishing a successful and continuing movie program, the B.C.R.A. hopes it will generate active community-wide interest and support, according to Robinson.

Until the B.C.R.A. obtains its own projector, the Ravenswood Recreation Center had made its 16 mm projector available.





Construction Begins in June on New East Palo Alto Park

Construction is scheduled to begin within three weeks on a new park located on the vacant land adjacent to the Ravenswood Recreation Center, according to Kendall Simmons, Superintendent of the Ravenswood Recreation and Park District.

The park when finally com-pleted will contain large grassy areas, picnic tables, barbecue facilities, a horseshoe pit, shuffleboard, a children's garden center (where the kids can grow their own vegetables), and a tiny

The architect, Jack Buktenica, has designed the park with an African theme; there will be Kiosks, arbors, and an African

imagery wall.

Present plans call for completion of the park in two phases. The upcoming summer construction constitutes the first phase and includes work on all underground fixtures, landscaping and walkways. This includes no major structure, although one small Kiosk may be built on an alternate bid. Completion of phase one is projected for September or October.

Phase two would involve construction of the tiny tot area, barbecue pits, horseshoe area, kiosks, and other facilities.

Cost of the project is estimated at \$90,000-\$100,000 for phase one and \$70,000-\$80,000 for phase two. The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has made available \$80,000 provided the Ravenswood Recreation and Park District can come with matching funds.

The District has taken out a \$65,000 loan, \$50,000 of which will go toward the park. (The

remaining \$15,000 is earmarked for improvements on existing buildings.) This still leaves \$30,000-\$40,000 outstanding.
"It was always the feeling of

the Recreation and Park Board that the County would assist by supplying one-fourth of the funds," explains Kendall Simmons, but when we went to the County in '69, they said they couldn't participate."

Simmons will suggest to the Board that they go before the East Palo Alto Municipal Council to ask their assistance in once again seeking funds from the County. "If we got \$40,000 from the County we could com-

plete the park in one phase," he said.

In the meantime, Simmons has contacted various service organeffort to raise the needed monies. He hopes that groups like the Lions and the Kiwanis Club would be interested in donating .small parts of the park -- a picnic table, a barbecue pit, the shuffleboard.

The name of the new park will be selected from lists of suggestions turned in by local school children. "We want the kids to name the park," says Simmons, "we have sent out letters to all the schools in the community asking them to participate." Each area within the park will also be given a name.

Simmons has also taken the plans to the various elementary schools and Ravenswood High School to inform people on the park's progress and to get feed-



"We want to give the people some kind of idea, some kind of start," Simmons commented of the preliminary plan. "If enough people want something else, we're ready to make changes ... We want the community to say what they want here," he said.

Suggestions will be accepted at the district's headquarters up to January 28 when the board must make a final decision.

The rec presently provides pool and gymnasium facilities, a social center and club room, and headquarters building.

The grant places certain conditions on how the land development can go. Simmons added, including restricting any building to less than 10 percent of the available land, a ceiling of \$25,000 on any one project (which prevents construction of a community theater, for instance), and no allowance for indoor facilities, such as a Teen Center.

The emphasis is of the development grants is on open space and green belts. The preliminary plan takes this into account, Simmons said, by preserving many of the large trees on the land.


AROUND THE BEATS

East P.A. pool being renovated

THE RAVENSWOOD RECREATION AND Park District, the only tax-supported agency in East Palo Alto that was formed by and for the people in the area and is paid for by

them, is now in the midst of an ambitious swimming pool renovation project.



The pool they have now was built in 1954 and grew badly in need of repairs. These now are being made at a cost of \$4.000.

Perhaps more important, a heater is being added at a cost of about \$6,000. Kendall Simmons, district superintendent, says addition of the heater will mean hundreds of East Palo Alto children can learn to swim because the pool will be open nine months out of the year. It has been open only in summer months when the water is warm enough.

Ninety per cent of the children in East Palo Alto can't swim, Simmons estimates. Statistics show there are 4,500 people in the community under 18. Total population in the area is 27,000, about 75 per cent black.

The district hopes the swimming pool heater will benefit the residents by allowing expanded swimming lessons, lifeguard training and recreational swimming.

The Independent Insurance Agents of Menlo Park recently donated \$500 toward the project.

O THER SERVICES THE DISTRICT OFfers to its community include preschool classes for 3-, 4- and 5-year-olds. The classes are designed to teach children "to adjust to different social environments and to learn to function in group activities."

Children's arts and crafts classes are offered during after-school hours for older youngsters. There are Teen Club activities during the evenings at the Social Center in district headquarters, 550 Bell St., for 7th through 12th graders.

For adults there are many recreational activities, including quieter ones like whist. A senior citizens group meets regularly at the center for social events and travel to Bay Area points of interest.

THE RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT was formed in 1951 by the people in the community. In addition to conducting classes and recreation activities at the center, it operates activities at area schools and at Jack Farrell Park, named after the new Atherton city manager. Farrell was very active in promoting recreational innovations in East Palo Alto schools and the district in the 1950s.

The district is currently working on expansion of a park near its center, a \$230,000 project accomplished with the aid of federal funds.

The current \$141,000 budget is financed with a tax rate of 50 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, paid for by East Palo Alto's property owners, many of whom are in the low-income brackets.

Programs are administered by Simmons, a 28-year-old, energetic black man. He is a graduate of California State College at Hayward, where he was a basketball player.

A NOTHER IMPROVEMENT IN THE EAST Palo Alto community is the classes for adults offered there by the Menlo-Atherton Adult School. A new session is beginning this week.

The adult school office, which is in the jurisdiction of the Sequoia Union High School District, is located at Menlo-Atherton High School, Middlefield Road at Ravenswood Avenue, Atherton.

Most of the classes will be taught at Ravenswood High School in East Palo Alto during the evening. These include basic education in fundamental subjects for persons who do not have an eighth-grade diploma, electronics assemblage, Swahili and upholstery.

Other classes such as sewing, the Ravenswood Co-op Nursery School and a daytime session in upholstery making are taught at churches or at the nursery school at 840 Donohoe St.

Interested residents can obtain the time and exact places of these classes from the adult school office, 322-8352. Registration is held at the first meeting of the class.

More black hiring urged for East PA park work

"Not enough hiring from the community" was the complaint sounded at a Ravenswood Recreation and Park District meeting Wednesday night by members of a Midpeninsula association of minority contractors.

The group threatened to set up picket lines if the district does not hire blacks at its park construction site directly behind the district offices at 550 Bell St. in East Palo Alto.

East Palo Alto, an unincorporated area of southeast San Mateo County, has a large

minority population.

Charles Galloway of the Midpeninsula Contractors Association made the demands. The association is a two-year-old group of black, Chicano and Oriental contractors, which aims at seeing that minority workers are hired in proportion to their precentage of the total population.

Galloway was backed up by Israel Harris, a longtime East Palo Alto activist and member of the San Mateo County Affirmative Action Council, which attempts to insure that affirmative action programs for hiring minorities are not ignored by public and private groups.

Since the \$160,000 park project is being funded in part by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), it is subject to San Mateo County's affirmative action program for proportional hiring, Galloway argued.

HUD requires that during 1972, minorities make up at least 8 per cent of the work force on all projects in San Mateo

County. The figure is to increase to 12 per cent by 1975.

Galloway added that true affirmative action in East Palo Alto would mean a much larger proportional representation than the HUD minimums, "since this is a 90-per cent minority community."

He then asked the board why only one black man—a 16-year-old youth—had been hired for the 14-man crew now working on the \$95,000 first phase of park construction.

Galloway received these answers:

-At the time of receiving the HUD grant, the affirmative action program had not been required for projects under \$500,000.

-Even though it had not been required, all subcontractors at the park are minority contractors – albeit not blacks.

—Every effort was made to find black contractors to bid on the project, a search being made by board members and staff who looked "from Gilroy to Oakland."

Supt. Kendall Simmons said that 70 per cent of those now working on the park were Chicanos and Indians.

"There's a whole conglomerate of races out there," Board Member Robert Sanders commented.

"We've done everything possible to have affirmative action here, to have blacks working. That's what we're about," Sanders said.

Galloway said he knew of more than 500 minority contractors in the Midpeninsula and that none of those he contacted knew anything about the park project.

Board Chairwoman Mrs. Everlyn Wallace pointed out that the bidding for the project had been advertised in area newspapers twice in May. Although five contractors bid the first time, the board felt that the bids were too high so it rejected all of them.

In the second round of bidding, Palo Alto Landscape of Palo Alto was awarded the Phase One contract for \$95,000.

The board said Palo Alto Landscape had agreed to hire minority subcontractors for the second part of Phase One, which is due to begin in about two weeks when a delay caused by the Bay Area cement strike is over.

"If blacks are going to be hired in the next phase of construction, that's beautiful," Galloway said. "If not, we'll set up picket lines."

"It seems to like children," the captain said, adding that an informant told him:



Hoover application sets park pot aboil

Robert Hoover, perhals the most controversial leader in East Palo Alto's history, has applied for the superintendent's post of the Ravenswood Parks and Recreation Department.

The small district, with a largely subsidized \$330,000 annual budget, has been disrupted by unrest since its former superintendent, Kendall Simmons, left a year ago. Simmons took a job with the San Mateo County recreation department.

After he left, the district's swimming pool — the only public pool in East Palo Alto — was closed because of a plumbing malfunction. That, and an inordinate amount of accumulated overtime among employes, led to layoffs and subsequent protests.

Successive attempts to find a new superintendent failed. After the last round, the board issued a statement that it "has been trying to work with a set of guidelines which it inherited and which do not reflect a real world situation."

Hoover, who applied for the \$1,134-monthly post in April, is one of five applicants, none of whom qualified under the original set of criteria.

He currently is president of the Ravenswood City School District Board of Education and is completing a research project funded by the Carnegie Foundation trhough the black-oriented Nairobi College.

Hoover said Wednesday that he is seeking the superintendent's post because "people in the community asked me to."

"That's the way this community operates," Hoover said., "people ask you to do things."

However, Wilfred Bocage, a recreation board member, contends there have been pressure tactics by a group of Hoover supporters — and that those tactics have produced an air of turmoil connected with the selection of a new superintendent.

"As a person who was elected to do the best job possible, I intend to do it," Bocage said during a recent interview, "My philosophy is I won't bend

under group pressure."

In late May, when the pressure began according to Bocage, a group of about 50 Hoover-supporters sang, made loud noises, and played a piano while the recreation board met in gree in recreation or an allied field was lowered to read a bachelor's degree in recreation or physical education. Hoover holds a B.S. degree in physical education.

The board also added criteria, among which is a requirement for an "Established pattern of informed and sensitive leadership in recreation and community development in a special district such as the East Palo Alto area."

Later, the recreation board created a new screening committee and assigned it the task of interviewing the applicants again under the new criteria.

During selection of committee members, the name of Henry Organ, director of Nairobi Schools, was submitted by board member Everlyn Wallace, a former candidate fot the Ravenswood City School District Boad of Education and a potential future candidate for that board.

The recreation board rejected Organ's nomination, which resulted in a protest by Gertrude Wilks, the founder of Nairobi Schools and a close ally of Hoover.

However, Board Chairman Marian Grayson said that Organ, prior to his nomination to the screening committee, addressed a letter to the recreation district endorsing Hoover for the job. That, she said, was the reason Organ was not selected.

The screening committee interviewed all the applicants except Hoover, who was on a month-long visit to Africa, returning just last Friday.

Henry Anthony, chairman of the East Palo Alto Municipal Council, and two of his staff made a special visit to the recreation board prior to an executive session last month and encouraged the board to wait for Hoover's return before picking a new superintendent.

Frank Satterwhite, also known as "Omwalee," the assistant superintendent of the Ravenswood City School District also was at the district offices at about the same time. The board agreed to withhold its selection until after the screening committee interviews Hoover.

Hoover's meeting with the screening committee is set for Saturday. The public announcement of a new superintendent should be made some days

In an exclusive interview with the Ravenswood Post, Carolina said he hopes to foster community volvement with Recreation Department by sponsoring big events thus enabling him to meet people from various agencies in the community.

Meanwhile, he hopes to poll the citizenry to determine what the community needs

He admits his desire to initiate new specialized classes such as gymnastics program, graphic arts (silk screening), and mechanics.

innovative programs, Carolina said there are no gymnastic programs being offered in any black community in the Bay Area, and "this is an area young people can get into and develop their untapped talents.

Asked what his plans are for the recreation district. Carolina stated that his long range plan includes the renovation of the Jack Farrell Park and he promised to explore the possibility to have a drama theatre built on Jack Farrell Park grounds.

When asked what he would do to stem criminal activities at the Jack Farrell Park. Carolina said he would have more lights installed at the park. He attributed the inadequate lighting at the park as a contributory factor.

"Inadequate lighting gives incentive to criminal elements in the area," he said.

He promises to utilize the park for more outdoor family activities such as community picnics, football and soft ball leagues and little league baseball.


"The more you get people out to see their tax dollar in. preciate it and make use of the facility," he stated.

Meanwhile, he hopes the East Palo Alto Sheriff's Substation will beef up its patrol of the park site as he meets with community leaders and seek how the recreation programs could be restructured to meet community's needs.

Carolina is making attempts to heal the wounds as he tries to enlist what he saying he would like to see termed "the leadership potential of Bob Hoover" for community turned into mini his programs.

In response to his critics who doubt his ability to function effectively as superintendent, Carolina said "My job is to design good leisure programs for the community, and I'll have to do that to the best of my ability, and I will work with all factions in the community. I am here to work with everybody, and to help our young people develop".

He concluded the interview some of the open spaces in the parks.



Mrs. Grayson told the audience that there were many reasons why the original procedures could not be followed. She said that at the time the screening was done, Hoover was out of the country. She said the board had not been notified by Hoover that he would be away.

Hoover sat very quiet, and was calm throughout the meeting. His only response was to congratulate Mr. Carolina. He said of the people protesting that if the community is not satisfied with the hiring by the board the problem could be solved at the polls, and that decision would involve changing the board.

Mrs. Grayson told the Ravenswood Post after the meeting that she had been very frightened by the protest. She said, "I think the screening committee made a good choice for the job. My only concern is that the best man get the job," she said

Senior Active In Community Work

Mrs. Lettie Manuel is very active in the University A.M.E. Zion Church in Palo Alto. She was awarded a plaque in January 1974, for a century of community service.

She especially enjoyed attending Sunday school.

According to Mrs. Hester Harrison, Secretary of the Church, "Mrs. Manuel is true to the church, she lived on the church's property for sometime. During which time she gave of her service to maintain the church's upkeep. Her room was always opened to visitors and members for conversation and refreshments."

Reflections of Early Childhood

Mrs. Manuel was four years of age when her mother died, leaving eight children to be cared for by the father. At the young age of four, she had responsibilities as well as other family members to maintain the home and care for the family needs. She enjoyed assisting older sisters in preparing meals.

The father did his best to keep the family together and provide the essentials of living on the government leased land the family lived on. When her father was freed by the slave master he was given pairs of animals to start a farm and provide a living for himself. The master admonished her father "Never beg, steal or borrow

She does not recall any hardships or hunger. She stated, "maybe there were

some hard times we children were not aware of existing". The father earned money by shearing sheep and raising livestock on a commission to share in profits of sale. "My father was very strict with rules and regulations governing his family". He instilled in his children "never lie. always be truthful and honest." The family went to church three times on Sundays.

In the early days the church provided for their spirtual needs The church also was the only source for entertainment. "We had singing groups. Everyone enjoyed attending revivials"

She had to walk four miles to the nearest school which was in the home of a catholic missionary. "In the 1800's there were so few people living in Bedford County we had to get along with each other and attend the same school. Neighbors attended to the needs and welfare of each other." She believes people had more freedom in the early days than what we call freedom today. "The government today use different means to keep the people separated such as fighting each other, separate schools and competition to name a few" she said.

Since early childhood she always wanted to become a teacher. In leisure time she read every book or piece of print she could get. "My favorite story told to me by my father was Jonah and the whale, which was so hard for me to conceive a fish swallowing a big

man "

The most exciting event in her early years was the coming of the train through Bedford County. For two years people watched as workers laid tracks. Finally, notices were sent out that the train would come through. Everyone turned out for this occasion, according to Mrs. Manuel, as the train approached the crowd. bellowing smoke was terrifying. She was the first one over the hill.

She went to school for three days in Alabama to Madam Barthell's Private School. Classes began at 8:00 and ended at 4:00 p.m. Students had twentyminutes for recess at midday, at which time they would eat and walk down to the spring for a drink of water. When they were in school every minute was utilized in teaching. "Students learned more in three months at Madam Barthell's School than what is learned today with a year of schooling.


She kept busy keeping house for the family and sometimes taking care of white children. "I was paid very little, thirty cents a week or at best fifty cents a month, we were all happy and managed to live. They had very little time for idleness because of the many chores they had to do. She received her first male company when she reached twenty-one years of age. "I enjoyed fishing when there was leisure time, except on Sundays which was God's Day."

She married a West Indian and moved to Nashville, Tennessee seeking work. She worked in homes, cleaning and taking care of children while her husband cooked, "he was a very fine cook she commented." They had no children.

Concerned about the nungry, women reap a harvest of love

Seven months ago a group of concerned Midpeninsula churchwomen decided to do something to alleviate hunger among the poor in the area.

And the fruits of their efforts since then are now being harvest-

ed - literally.

The group, called the Ecumenical Hunger Project, has formed a branch called the Food Closet Coalition, whose goal is to provide food for needy families at several locations in East Palo Alto, East Menlo Park and Palo Alto.

People are donating to the coalition from their gardens as well as their pockets, according to Miriam Nixon, coordinator of the

project.

Many Midpeninsula residents have trees and gardens in their backyards which provide more produce than they themselves can eat, Mrs. Nixon said.

Rather than allow the food to be wasted, the coalition has asked people to "donate" their trees. Volunteers, called "gleaners," pick the owner's tree clean, leave with him as much of the fruit as he wishes to keep, and distribute the rest at the food closets.

By way of thanks, the volunteers return in mid-winter to prune the tree.

In addition to receiving surpluses from residents' vegetable gardens, the coalition has also stocked its closets with bulk purchases through the Briarpatch Cooperative Market in Palo Alto.

The coalition has spent about \$200 of the \$1,000 it has received in donation for bulk purchase of items such as peanut butter and new potatoes, Mrs. Nixon said.

The Ecumenical Hunger Project has also earmarked a portion of its revenues to the alleviation of world hunger problems. It has sent \$335 to the Hunger Commission of the Northern California Ecumenical Council, which channels relief funds to a variety of overseas projects.

The number of food closets in the coalition has grown from five to eight since it began in May. Closets are located at the Salva-

tion Army of Palo Alto; East Palo Alto Community Services Center; East Palo Alto Closet of Service League of San Mateo County; St. Francis of Assisi Church; Belle Haven office of the American Red Cross; Neighborhood Food Closet; Church of Christ; and the Ra-

venswood Recreation Center.

The Hunger Project draws its support from members of 18 Midpeninsula churches. Some members pledge money on a regular basic Man Nivon said some

donate large containers, some bring in surplus produce, some donate freezer space and some offer their trees to "gleaners."

Mrs. Nixon, whose base of operations is in the First Congregational Church of Palo Alto, said the Hunger Project grew from a January meeting of Church Women United. The women decided then to direct their efforts in Christian service to the problems of hunger, both locally and worldwide.



East Palo Alto's second annual spring parade got the Ravenswood Recreation and Park Department's Little League season off to a colorful, snappy start this morning.





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Community House Proposal Draws Vigorous Protests

Director Requests Meeting

Directors of the Community House have planned a community meeting Friday night in an attempt to smooth relations with area residents who are protesting their proposed move to 555 Bell St.

The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Community House, 1590 Bay Road.

The selection of the Bell Street location is prompting heated objections from neighbors, the Ravenswood Park and Recreation District (located directly across the street at 550 Bell St.) and the Community Church (two doors south on the corner of Bell Street and University Avenue).

Faced with eviction from their present building, Community House officials made formal application for a use permit at last week's County Planning Commission meeting, but the matter was continued until July 28 session.

The Community House is presently leasing its lot and building from Duca and Hanley markets. The project to widen University Avenue, scheduled to begin this month, will eliminate about half of the spaces in the grocery store's parking lot.


At the same time, Duca and Hanley is planning to build a small shopping center on the lots now occupied by Community House and the structure directly north of it.


Several months ago, store owner Sam Duca informed Community House Director Rev. Carl Smith of his intentions, and told him that he had until the end of August to find new facilties.


Rev. Smith's decision to apply for a use permit has resulted in objections from both




