Finances

This is the second in the series of reports on the J. B. Han-auer survey of incorporation for Alto. Last week East Palo outlined the procedure for in-corporation. This week we will give sources of revenue found in the report and the proposed first year budget of such a city.

CHAPTER 2
According to the J. B. Hanauer port, an incorporated city dereport. rives its income from the follow ing sources:

1. Taxes.
2. Licenses and permits such as licenses, building business mits and amusement permits.

3. Franchises and privil

privileges which include gas and electricity;

and garbage.

Subventions and grants, 4. cluding the in lieu motor vehicle licenses, the gas tax, the alcoholic beverage licenses and traffic safety with its fines and forfeitures.

5. Miscellaneous, such as trailer

tax and city sales tax.

TAX LIMITED

City taxes are personal property taxes with a maximum limit of \$1 100 dollar assessed valuation in a sixth class city; additional taxes must be approved by the vote the people.

Cities grant franchises and privito gas and electricity panies, such as the P.G. and the garbage company and the wacompanies, and return ter in charges them.

State funds returned to a city, include the Alcoholic Beverage License fees collected within the inocrporated limits of that city, which total approximately 90 per cent of these fees. These fees go into the general fund.

Motor Vehicle License fees is a tax imposed on all motor vehicles that are required to be registered under the State Vehicle Code. It under the State Vehicle Code. It is on an "ad valorem" basis and is at lieu of local personal proper-ty taxes on motor vehicles. Pro-ceeds from the tax are returned to cities and counties on a population basis. The apportionment is semi-annually, and the made in past two years has been a little ov-

These fees may be expended for law enforcement, regulation and and control of highway traffic, fire protection of highway traffic and any other state purpose.

STREET FUNDS

Gasoline Tax funds are used for expenditure on city streets. A sum equal to five-eights of one per cent per gallon tax on gasoline is made available from the state for these expenditures. At least 60 per cent must be expended for construction purposes on the major city street system. The remaining 40 per cent must be expended for maintenance purposes on any city street. How-ever, with approval of the State Department of Public Works, 100 per cent may be spent on construction of the major city street sys-tem. These funds are kept separate from the general fund for better accounting.
