

About Raices de México

Founded in 1980, Raíces de México is a non-profit, tax exempt organization whose mission is to promote cultural education through regional dance and Mexican popular art. Raíces de México offers Mexican regional dance classes to children, teens, and adults and is the only school of its kind in San Mateo / Santa Clara Counties. The organization also produces its own annual performances, cultural workshops and events to provide the audience with additional exposure to programs of high artistic and educational value.

Raíces de México has received awards and recognition for the quality of its work. The dance company was selected in 1994, 1997 and in 2001 to participate in the San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival held at the Palace of Fine Arts. Other accomplishments include participation in Channel 7's "Profiles in Excellence" program and an "Outstanding Performance" plaque from the Monte Jade Science and Technology Association.

PERFORMING GROUPS

RAICES DE MEXICO.... Entering its 23rd year of existence, Raices de México has built through consistent work and research an impressive repertoire of materials to promote Mexican folklore dance from eighteen distinct regions of México. In this occasion Raices de México brings to the stage the regional dances, known as "Huapangos" [meaning: dance over platform], from the southern region of the state of Tamaulipas (meaning: place of tall mountains) that is located in the northeast along the Gulf of México bordering with the United States. In the north central part of the Mexican Republic, completely land-locked is the state of Durango. Dominated by the Spanish from the middle of the 16th century, Durango did not become an independent state until 1824. Dance forms in Durango have been influenced not only by the Spanish but other European cultures as well. Also on the program today Raices de México performs dances from the state of Aguascalientes (Hot Waters) that premiered in the Bay Area at Raices de México's 20th anniversary celebration. Aguascalientes is a small state above Jalisco and is known for its thermal hot springs and its lace and embroidery handcrafts, among other things.

VIRGINIA IGLESIAS AND ALMA FLAMENCA...

Flamenco is the result of the integration of diverse musical elements from different cultures [Jewish, Moorish, Christian and Indian] that had immigrated to Andalucia [Southern Spain] between the 8th and 15th centuries. One of the most compelling elements of flamenco is that it is more than a style of music, rather it is a way of life. The music originated among the gypsies of Andalucia as an outlet for emotions: happiness, love, sadness, grief, and desperation. Flamenco does not depend so much upon technical perfection but rather on the ability of the performer to convey an intense emotion, and on the receptivity of the audience as well. Dedicated to t he art of flamenco for the past 20 years, Ms. Iglesias began her professional dance career in Madrid where she received her training in Madrid's renowned flamenco academy Amor De Dios with many of the great Spanish masters. Since 1991 Ms. Iglesias has delighted audiences with her dynamic and passionate performances.

She has made extensive appearances as a guest artist, master teacher and innovative choreographer. She was featured soloist in the 1998 San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival and has danced on television, film and radio as well as for the Mayor of San Francisco. As director of The Flamenco Academy of Dance based in San Francisco, Ms. Iglesias offers classes in San Francisco and Palo Alto to adults and children in all levels of flamenco dance. Her company Alma Flamenca, is an extension of her teaching academy, consisting of her advanced and pre-professional students, allowing students to gain valuable performing experience. PERUVIAN DANCE TROUPE Coordinated by Martha Espejo, the Peruvian Dance Troupe has been actively involved in the preservation of the "Marinera Norteña", the national dance of Peru. For fifteen years Ms. Espejo served as Artistic Director of the Troupe and during that time the Peruvian Dance Troupe was selected to participate in the San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival in 1992 and 1994. The Dance Troupe has presented itself in many different venues throughout the Bay Area such as theaters, universities, The Academy Of Science, the Peruvian Consulate, schools and festivals. Besides going out of her way to promote the culture of Peru, Ms. Espejo owns the only known private collection of traditional Peruvian Costumes from at least 15 different provinces of Peru that she exhibits on occasion in fundraising fashion shows. Many of the dances of Aguascalientes (Hot Waters) are products of free creation depicting diverse folklore elements characteristic of the state, i.e., society, duties, customs. The dances presented tonight are such samples of free creation. These dances in particular were created for the famous "Feria de San Marcos" (Saint Marcos Fair) which is held every April 25. These dances were showcased at the Fair in 1965 and were awarded the best respresentative dances of the state of Aguascalientes. The dances speak of the beauty of the state, its women and the famous cockfights of the fair. The women's costume has panels of lace and embroidered flowers or grapes (the state fruit). Lace work and embroidery are two of the handcrafts Aguascalientes is known for.

The suede costume, known as "cuera" [(hide), was once considered a vestment of luxury and is now the representative costume of the state. The "cuera" originated in the southeastern part of the state, in the town of Tula, where the climate is dry and cold, around the middle of the 19th century. The original design had only the fringe, copied from the Apache indians of the north. With the fall of the second empire the costume took on more definition in its decoration. The "huapango" is also said to be a campesino's fiesta as well as a dance on a platform, it is an artistic manifestation whose song is a poem that speaks of the simple and ingenious acts and relevant actions of a campesinos life; a manifesting of a man's thoughts who finds himself deeply rooted in the fields and the sierra.
